ATOS™ Readability Formula—AT A GLANCE

What is ATOS?

ATOS is a readability formula that estimates the difficulty of books and other texts. ATOS is more accurate than Lexile because it uses four factors to determine the readability of a text.

ATOS Factors = Average Sentence Length + Average Word Length + Vocabulary Grade Level + The Number of Words in a Book

What is Lexile™?

Lexile is also a readability formula that estimates the difficulty of books. However, it is not as accurate as ATOS since it only uses two factors when determining the readability of a text.

Lexile Factors = Sentence Length + Word Frequency

Why is ATOS better than Lexile?

1. The ATOS recommended book-reading ranges are based on empirical evidence and appropriate to support independent reading.

ATOS	Lexile

2. ATOS is more accurate than Lexile. ATOS works especially well for emergent-reader books while other formulas overstate the difficulty. For example, *Five Little Kittens* (Geller, 1999) is a 32-page picture book that the publisher labels appropriate for grades K-3, ages 5-8. The ATOS level for *Five Little Kittens* is 2.6. This book has a Lexile level of 970 which equates to grades 6-7!



3. ATOS is parent-friendly since it uses a grade level scale easily understood by parents. For example, a reading level of 5.4 translates to "fifth year, fourth month." The Lexile Framework uses a 2,000-point scale which is confusing and holds little meaning for parents.

How can I use Accelerated Reader (AR) with Lexile-leveled books?

- When printing AR book labels, the ATOS readability formula is set as the default. Teachers can include an alternate book readability level on AR book labels by choosing alternate book level 2, which converts ATOS to a 2,000-point scale similar to the Lexile scale.

* The 2000-point scale Renaissance Learning has created above is a transformation of a book's ATOS level to a scale that is similar—but not identical—to the Lexile scale. The transformation was derived by analyzing ATOS and Lexile data on more than 19,000 books. ATOS measures are based on four characteristics of the book (average sentence length, average word length, vocabulary grade level, and the number of words in the book), while Lexile measures are based on two (sentence length and word frequency).

Because Lexile uses fewer characteristics to estimate the reading difficulty level of a book, Renaissance Learning would expect Lexile to be somewhat less accurate than ATOS. The 2000-point scale information should be useful to anyone who is accustomed to using Lexiles, because its values will be reasonable approximations in most cases.
